Her accolades include the Eleanor Clark Slagle Lectureship in 1987 and the World Federation of Occupational Therapy keynote speaker in 1990 in Melbourne, Australia. As of this 2014 Cognitive Symposium, Claudia is launching an app to facilitate interactive access to the Allen Cognitive Levels and revising the 6 levels to identify goals and methods for an evidence-based practice. Claudia is an ex-officio member of the board of the Allen Cognitive Network and Advisors, Ltd and a member of the Allen Cognitive Group/ACLS and LACLS Committee. Most recently, she co-authored the *Manual for the Allen Cognitive Level Screen-5 (ACLS-5)* and Large Allen Cognitive Level Screen-5 (LACLS-5) (Allen, Austin, David, Earhart, McCraith & Riska-Williams, 2007).
